SERIALS COOPERATION TASK FORCE

At the July 14 meeting of the University of Missouri library directors, the Serials Cooperation Task Force was established in response to a discussion of a paper on serials cooperation submitted by myself. The Task Force "is to come up with a proposal as to how the four campuses might communicate and coordinate intents to cancel serials or to inaugurate new subscriptions." Hele Spalding will serve as Chair and the Task Force will submit its proposal to the directors through Dr. LaBudde UMKC Library Director, who is chairing the directors

Ms. Spalding has scheduled a meeting of the Task Force

of RLG's Serials Petition, outlining the serials cooperation program used at Yale.

We will also want to consider the following questions:

- What present criteria and policies are followed to cancel or inaugurate new subscriptions at each library?
- 2) What present cooperation exists with other libraries concerning serials subscriptions? (UMC announces proposed serials cancellations in its Library News Notes. The Linda Hall Library of Science and Technology notifies UMKC of its serial cancellations) What network relationships exist? Others?
- 3) What special problems are involved in current cooperation efforts?
- 4) What special problems need to be addressed in forming this new cooperative relationship?

MELVIN D. GEORGE ON WLN

The Cabinet and President Olson have accepted the library directors and Jim Corey recommendation that we proceed with the development of an on-line catalog for the University, in cooperation with Washington University and the Missouri State Library. The Cabinet was much impressed with the Washington Library Network demonstration, and all four campuses have supported implementation as soon as possible.

I am very pleased at this decision. Certainly, it reflects the careful work which you did in reviewing the system, in making available the WLN demonstration to the entire University community, and in openly evaluating the system after the demonstration. I am confident that this

will lead to significant improvements in florary erecttions in years to come.

Because the full amount of money required for operations

is not yet in hand, I have suggested to Jim Corey that he work with Purchasing to plan the solicitation of bids and the bid openings in such a way that a final decision would not have to be made until April or May of 1981. This should be late enough in the legislative session so that we have a pretty good idea about the availability of resources. I assume also that Jim Corey will be working closely with the computer network people so that the impact of this decision can continue to be taken into account in their plan for network operations for 1981–82 and beyond.

EDUCATION LIBRARY

This summer it was announced that SERS (Special Educa-

tion Resource Center), which is housed above the Education Library, would lose its funding. Although we regret the loss of the full complement of SERS services to UMSL students and faculty and area teachers, we are very pleased that the Education Library has been given the SERS collection. This collection includes many kits, tests and other materials in the field of special education. The staff is now inventorying the collection so that the appropriate records can be made to give full access to the collection. While the inventory is being completed, these materials can be borrowed by requesting access at the Education Library Circulation Desk.

Portions of the elementary and secondary textbook collection and the juvenile literature collection have been shifted to make room for the new Health Sciences collection. This collection will serve the Optometry program this year and will be expanded to include materials for the Nursing program next year. Our fearless leader, Ron Krash, was the Prime Mover.

During the MACRL session of MLA, Sally Beck has been invited to present a paper on bibliographic access to curriculum guides. This paper has also been accepted for publication in the 1980 fall issue of Behavioral and Social Sciences Librarian.

WILDLIFE IN MISSOURI - WHAT TO LOOK FOR THIS FALL

The fall migration season is upon us again. You, like most people, are probably unprepared for the event. Where are your binoculars, assorted bird books, audubon bird whistlers, sun visor, mechanical duck, various bags of exotic seeds, cameras, variegated bird watching attire and camp stool? Without these items you will probably miss the migration of the greater-lesser lumpkin, a rare bird of the Mississippi river way. It is perhaps most noted for its habit of nesting in the direct path of uncoming barges on large floating nests of industrial waste, (clever fellows). Another rare bird, which can only be seen in the deep forest regions of downtown St. Louis or surrounding suburbs, is the

Dutter of Old Orchard, Mo. The Wilma Budgee is noted for its peculiar feeding habits, flying as much as

nundred miles in search of health bread crumbs. The nature of their diet and exertion necessary to find a adequate supply of health bread has, over the years, reduced their size to that of a horse fly, making their citing a challenge even for the most avid bird watcher.

An outstanding example of native Missouri bird life is the Lemon-Winged Firth, or rather first, cited at Pomroy, Missouri by Elroy Firth, founder of the Pomroy Exotic Bird and Archiac Ballard Society. Ancient legend has it that the first person to see the firth will suffer a curse of constant thirst, but there is no scientific evidence to support the legend. The firth is one of America's slowest moving birds, sometimes taking up to two weeks to negotiate a distance of one hundred yards.

These are only a few of the adventures awaiting the amateur acnethologist.
